Rattletrap 1971 LC GTR



y name is Paul Meyers, I joined the GTR XU-1 Car Club about 2 months ago after finally making the decision to restore my 1971 LC GTR, I have had the car for at least 30 years but it's sat in the shed for 15 after taking it off the road, my father calls it, 'The Rattletrap'.

The car is an Albany car, sold new in 1971 from Manley Stanwell Holden in Albany. I have also obtained an original dealer sticker for the rear window. The cars original colour is Indy Orange and the plans are to keep it that same colour.

I have been informed that this car could be an ex police vehicle, although nothing verified as yet. When I purchased the car it had spotlights, a 186 engine with triple carburetors, instead of the 161s motor. It also had holes in the rear floor behind the front passenger seat, supposedly shackle holes. Radio holes under the dash and the aerial hole further forward on the front fender. The differential also has a non standard ratio more suited maybe for highway work. So far the car has thrown the usual challenges with rust in the sills, lower front fenders and front valance. But the rear fenders are the worst (very dented) I think this was done to make the bog stick back in the day. Looks like it was done with a ball peen hammer. Usual story, you think the car looks good until you get it back to bare metal.

This is an ongoing project and would like to take the opportunity to thank, Trevor Peters for the use of the rotisserie, Mike from Bridgetown for helping with the restoration, and Mike Bell for checking the numbers. Oh and my understanding wife, Dina.

I will keep you posted on the restoration and look forward to some club runs.


With plenty of friendly banter the day was a huge success and thanks again to Bill & Val for welcoming members to their home.

Here's a clever way to protect your fuel cap from theft while keeping that original nonlocking cap.

The first step is the crucial one, working out where to drill the hole. Using the hole that is already in the back of the cap as the pin locating point, mark this on your rear panel. Then triple check and check again to make sure it's in the correct spot.

It looks like the hole is on the same circumference as the filler screws and midway between them. Once you're happy, drill the hole through the filler flange and rear boot panel.

Using a lock washer and a spring, set-up your locking pin as pictured. Make a little bracket in the boot to locate the pin. Create a little bend or fit a knob to the end of pin.



So now to open the fuel cap, the boot lid needs to be opened then pull on the spring loaded pin while undoing the petrol cap.

Too easy.





Who needs roller rockers?

Here's a rare piece of history. Sent in by Russell after he dug it out of his old technical data from his days as an apprentice at GMH. This mod from the era, dated February 1974, is designed to improve the natural misalignment of the push-rod guide holes.

GROUP 6A FEBRUARY,1974

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
SUBJECT: VALVE STEM TIP WEAR

MODELS : TORANA GTR - XU1

Wear of valve stem tip and rocker arm in XU1 engines is associated with misalignment of push rod guide holes, relative to valve and rocker arm stud centrelines.

To correct this condition rebuild the cylinder head assembly, replacing any worn values and studs with new parts. The original equipment value rocker arms are replaced by HQ(L6 engine) arms 2811931 and the special ball seat is replaced by cylindrical pivots made from HQ (L6 or V8) pivots 2811933 or 7434861. Details of the rework to pivots shown below.

Adjustment of the valve train is unchanged.
